Pastor's Message

Dear Friends.

"My spiritual life is as tough as an old boot," writes Choctaw Elder/Episcopal Bishop Steven Charleston. "I bet yours is too. That's because we use them. Not just in the peaceful times of our lives, but when the going gets rough. Spiritual life is a collection of tools, meant to work for us, meant to take on the hard jobs of life. Life is a construction site. Love, the labor we invest each day."

A spiritual life as a construction site. What a great metaphor—for the life of faith, individually and also as a church, especially one like United.

United people know a lot about construction sites, since we've been through a lot of building projects over the last 45 years—the 1983 very small Sanctuary and multipurpose room; 1987 Lizard House storage space-turned-Youth-Room for a decade; 1989 Learning Center; 1994 Temporary Modular Unit (aka trailer) for infants and toddlers; 1998 Community Room and Nurture Center; 2001 Sanctuary and Office expansion; and 2018 Education Wing that we finished just before the pandemic shut everything down.

We've lived through a lot of re-construction projects, too—a new roof three years after the first building was finished and rebuilding the adobe wall and replacing windows a few years later. There's also been the landscape construction, a multi-year project that is still a work-in progress.

For the United community, life has been a constant construction site. But it hasn't all been stick, stucco, and stone. Taking a lesson from Msrg. Jerome Martinez—the founding pastor of Santa Maria de la Paz who also restored St. Francis Cathedral as a building <u>and</u> a vibrant faith community in the early 2000's—we've sought to build the United community and our ministries of education, care, music, and partnerships with the wider community even as we painted walls, hammered nails, and replaced windows.

Five years ago, United—like every other faith community—had to undertake another kind of building project, namely the construction of a "virtual church," for which there was definitely no blueprint or master plan. Then we built "outside church," and then "hybrid church."

In 2025, United continues to be a construction site as we face a different future than we expected pre-pandemic 5 years ago. We also face a future that has much uncertainty. But as United has done for over four decades, we will keep building on the foundation of faith, hope, and love upon which this church was founded and that has been strengthened with each generation. Steven Charleston affirms that the "spiritual life is a collection of tools," and United has a lot to work with—starting with our life of worship, song, and prayer together (which one could call "the buckle of our toolbelt":-).

I give thanks for United's firm foundation. I give thanks for all of you and those who have gone before us to build this church, inside and out, spiritually and literally. Most of all, I give thanks to the Master Builder and for the tools of faith, hope, and love for us to use this year and all the years to come.




Worship in February

God's Love: Trust It Enough to "Put Out into the Deep" February 9 – FebFest Sunday

Isaiah experienced God's call while at prayer in the temple. (Isaiah 6:1-13) Simon Peter experienced it after a long and empty night of fishing. (Luke 5:1-11) Both the not-yet-prophet and not-yet-disciple have to "put out into the deep"—i.e., deep trust of God's love to do what God is calling them to do. It's scary to go that deep in any relationship. But it's the only way to go. We welcome FebFest guest Dr. Brandon Boyd in worship and to share his experience of "putting into the deep" as a composer and conductor.





God's Love: Sturdy Against the Storm February 16

A life built on the rock or built on the sand? That's the choice Jesus laid out to his listeners—and to us. (Luke 6:46-49). He also promised that God's love is strong enough to withstand wind, rain, and all the storms of life. How do we trust that promise?



God's Love: Poured Out Like Tears February 23

An unnamed "woman of the street" disrupts a dinner party by pouring precious oil over Jesus' feet and wiping them with her tears. (Luke 7:30-8:3) What a mess! The religious leader hosting the dinner is indignant, but Jesus' praises the woman for the love she poured out for him and over him. Have we ever been that lavish with our love? Or that courageous? A great story for the Sunday of the Congregational Budget Meeting.

United's Outreach Giving Totals \$96,970 in 2024

United Church members and friends, in Santa Fe and across the country, gave over \$96,000 this past year to "love God by loving our neighbor and God's creation."

Over \$19,000 went to the United Church of Christ, regionally and nationally, as well as to special offerings (One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Fund) and local congregations in need.

The remainder went to both local and international partners to provide support and supplies for Ukrainian, Gazan, and Sudanese refugees, Roots (the Palestinian/Israeli peace initiative), Navajo/Diné relief, regular meals for guests of Santa Fe shelters, gift cards for public schools families in need, legal aid for immigrants, books and social workers for public school kids, support for composting, carbon offset for climate advocacy, hurricane, fire, and other climate catastrophe relief, and financial assistance for members and friends facing medical or other emergency needs.

In addition, United's outreach efforts are supported by extensive staff and volunteer involvement. A detailed report of outreach giving will be provided in the Feb. 23 Congregational Budget Meeting.

Thank you all, near and far, who made such generosity possible! And who will continue it into the future as we are called to "Love God, Love Neighbor, Love Creation."

Compassionate Christmas Gift Market

Pick up compostable garbage bags at the church (NO standard plastic bags, please), fill them at home, and bring back to put in the green bin by the Children's Garden. More things in compost bins means less in landfills. Thanks!

United's "Carbon Offset Program" helps plant trees and change policies to address climate change. It's simple to do: track your car mileage and/or plane flight hours and donate through United to our partners *Tree New Mexico* and *NM Interfaith Power and Light*. Reading Bonhoeffer in America 2025 Jan. 26; Feb. 2, 16; Mar. 2

Professor Emeritus of Social Ethics, Larry Rasmussen is a leading scholar in the witness and work of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German theologian and pastor who was part of the Resistance movement against the Nazis and who paid for his actions with his life.
