Pastor's Message

You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.

Jesus Christ in the Gospel of John (8:32)

(As Jesus stood before the Imperial Governor) Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

Pilate asked him, "What is truth?"

The Gospel of John 18:37-38

Dear Friends,

Truth is having a hard time these days. Whether we call them "misstatements," "falsehoods," "misinformation," or just plain "nonsense," the fact of the matter is that lies abound. Lies like "the U.S. spends 25% of our budget on foreign aid." (Truth: It's 1%.) Or that foreign aid was to include "\$100 million for condoms for Hamas." (Truth: Not a penny.) Or "childhood vaccines cause autism." (Truth: Debunked years ago. What is true is that not being vaccinated leads to the spread of childhood—and adult—life-threatening and crippling diseases like measles, whooping cough, and polio.) Or "Ukraine started the war with Russia" (Fact check: Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022 and has continued the invasion ever since.)

When it comes to discerning what it means to be Christian, separating truth from falsehood is equally challenging. Just google "Jesus and guns" or "Jesus and women preachers," and you'll get the picture.

So, what <u>can</u> we say is true about the life, ministry and message of Jesus Christ? For me, these are some basic truths I hold fast about the Christian faith and that I find in the Gospels:

- Jesus knew what it was like to be human, with all its joys and all its sorrows.
- Jesus fed the hungry.
- Jesus healed the sick.
- Jesus welcomed the outsider and the stranger.
- Jesus had compassion on others, whether it was the rich young man or the outcast woman.
- Jesus could have a good time.
- Jesus loved deeply—and he let his heart be broken more than once.
- Jesus held leaders—religious, political, business—accountable.
- Jesus knew God was present throughout creation—from the birds of the air and the grass of the field to the bread and the cup.
- Jesus spoke the truth, even when it cost him life.
- Jesus showed us God's ways of life over our ways of death.
- Jesus gave his life for others.
- Jesus called—and calls—us to do the same.

What do you know to be true about Jesus Christ? What difference does it make in your life? In this time when truth-telling is so vital, what would it take for you to tell the truth—out loud—about your faith?

FROM MOUNTAINTOPS AND MARDI GRAS TO ASHES AND LENT

Let the Light Shine! — Mardi Gras Sunday (March 2)

Grab your beads, find your feathers and toe-tapping shoes, and bring a friend as Jazz Pianist Andy Kingston blesses us once again in the 10:00 Mardi Gras Service. The scriptures tell of Moses' and Jesus' mountaintop experiences (Exodus 34:29-35; Luke 9:28-43) and how they brought God's Light to others. Good reminders for our often-shadowed time. (Also, 8:30 Contemplative Communion)



Where's Home? — Lent at United

Lent starts in the wilderness across the Jordan and leads to the wilderness of Golgotha. It also challenges us to find our home all along the way—whether within our own souls, our nation, or our Earth home. Lent worship also leads to the April 12 Lensic concert (sponsored by the United Church) of Brad Ellingboe's cantata "A Place Called Home," the night before Palm Sunday.

Cleaning House Ash Wednesday – March 5 12:00 Noon and 7:00 pm

"Is this not the fast I choose," God asked through the Prophet Isaiah, "to feed the hungry and clothe the naked?" (Isaiah 58) To do that, we need to clean house, so the Psalmist calls, "Create in me a clean heart and renew a right Spirit within me." We do that on Ash Wednesday, turning to ashes that which keeps us from God's new life. Dr. Jacquelyn Helin is the guest pianist.

Home in the Wilderness First Lent – March 9

"As a deer thirsts for streams," the Psalmist (Ps. 42) confessed, "so my soul longs for God." Jesus knew such thirst in his 40 days in the desert. (Luke 4:1-13) "When you share Passover," Moses told the people, "include the aliens and strangers." Like those outsiders, Jesus seldom had a safe place to call home. Perhaps he learned, as we must, that the wilderness itself *is* our home. **Daylight Saving Time begins, please set your clocks forward.**

Home in the Here, Now, and Hereafter Second Lent – March 16

What is God's house like? "It's a stronghold," wrote the Psalmists. "A shelter." "A place of beauty and peace." Jesus added, "It's like a mother hen gathering her brood." (Luke 13:31-35) What's our vision of "the house of the Lord"—both in the hereafter and the here and now? Rev. Ben Larzelere is guest preacher.

Home in the Steadfast Love Third Lent – March 23

"Come to the waters, all who thirst," proclaimed Isaiah. "Come, you who have no bread, and eat." (Isaiah 55:1-9) "You have been my help," cried the Psalmist (Ps. 63), "and in the shadow of your wings, I sing for joy." Both prophet and psalmist found their home in the steadfast love of God – and both call us to create home for others.

A New Home, A New Creation Joyous Lent – March 30

When the religious leaders chastised Jesus for eating with tax collectors and other "bad people," Jesus told them about a child who left home and got lost. When he finally returned, he learned the depth and breadth of his father's love. (Luke 15:1-3, 11-32) When discord threatened the young church in Corinth, the apostle Paul called his community into that love to be "a new creation" in Christ, to let Christ's new life transform their lives. (2 Corinthians 5:16-21) He called it "the ministry of reconciliation" – finding a home in one another's hearts because we have found a home in God's heart.

A Place Called Home is a dramatic cantata I wrote in 2022. It was premiered in Carnegie Hall in April of 2023 and the combined choruses of our Sanctuary Choir and Coro Lux will give the New Mexican premiere at the Lensic Theater on Saturday, April 12 of this year, thanks largely to the sponsorship of our church, for renting the hall, and the NM State Arts Council, for underwriting the cost of the soloists and instrumentalists.

The libretto is by the American poet Tony Silvestri, who will be our guest (via Zoom) in the adult forum on Sunday, March 9. The topic of the cantata is care for the earth. Tony will also be our guest (in person) in church on Sunday, April 13.

By the time you read this newsletter, both choirs will have begun preparations for the concert, which is not only the New Mexican premiere, but also the premiere of the newly-revised score. The concert will be preceded by a panel discussion led by Talitha, Tony, and me, as well as Prof. Larry Rasmussen and Dr. Mary Roessel. Tickets are now on sale at the Lensic, and more information about this will be forthcoming next month!

United contracts with Reunity Resources to turn compostable products (food waste, meat scraps, etc.) into rich, life-giving compost. Pick up compostable garbage bags at the church (NO standard plastic bags, please), fill them at home, and bring back to put in the green bin by the Children's Garden. More things in compost bins means less in landfills. Thanks!

United's "Carbon Offset Program" helps plant trees and change policies to address climate change. It's simple to do: track your car mileage and/or plane flight hours and donate through United to our partners *Tree New Mexico* and *NM Interfaith Power and Light*.
